**APPROVED** 1 2 HDC MEETING 3 AUGUST 1, 2019 4 5 Chair Rodney Rowland, Tom Maher, Elaine Nollet, Irene Bush and Judy Groppa. Members 6 Present: 7 8 Absent: Vice Chair Hughes, Kate Murray 9 10 Chair Rowland called the meeting of the New Castle HDC to order at 7:01 pm. He advised that there were three public hearings tonight. The Chair asked that 11 anyone wishing to speak, must please sign in and he advised that all applications 12 had been published, fees paid and abutters notified. All board members present 13 will be voting. 14 15 1. Public Hearing for Stephen Eldred, 180 Portsmouth Ave, to replace an out 16 building, formerly Boat House. Map 15 Lot 5 17 18 Guests: Alex Ross, Engineer & Surveyor, who prepared the plans, Charlie Hoyt, 19 Designer and Stephen Eldred, owner. 20 21 22 Alex Ross stated the Eldreds originally thought they would make minor repairs to the existing boathouse but it is in the flood zone which requires that everything be 23 brought up to code, which includes raising the foundation. Ross passed out 24 photos showing the condition of the foundation which is very poor and not 25 26 feasible to keep. They have obtained ZBA approval of Mr. Hoyt's design, and have also had a work session with the conservation commission, site meetings 27 with Eben Lewis from NH DES, and were before the HDC in June for a work 28 29 session. 30 Charles Hoyt stated the work session in June was quite positive, although it was 31 clear the board was concerned about materials, so he brought samples of 32 composite materials he proposed to use. They would like to use Kolbe windows 33 which are on the existing house, which is a wood window with a polychrome 34 finish applied in the factory and has aluminum mutton bars. Hoyt would also like 35 to introduce a synthetic material for the casing, either Azek or Boral. Boral is a 36 material which uses fly ash and polyresins, a very strong product, better than 37 Azek. Hoyt passed around samples of Boral and advised the board that 38 everywhere in the application packet where it says Azek, he would like the option 39 to use Boral. The soffit will be Azek beadboard or Boral. He spoke with a builder 40 in Newburyport who swears by the product adding that it comes in any shape you 41 want. None of the lumber yards supplied this material two months ago but now it 42 is more available. It also takes paint like glass. 43 44 45 At the June work session, Hoyt discussed putting raised panels under the windows

on the South elevation and wanted to make a case for keeping the panels. They

are keeping much of the same materials and color to tie the boat house into the main house. He also presented a sample of the cedar roof.

Chair Rowland stated that, at the work session in June, the board discussed that this is a boathouse and not a house. The Chair thought the raised panels were a lot of detail especially with the brow window which Hoyt desired to install. Rowland advised that it may be a compromise if they wanted the brow window as the board wanted a simpler design.

Mr. Hoyt stated that with all due respect he understood what the Chair was saying but wanted to make the case for the panels again. The front door, which is on the east elevation or river elevation, will be similar to the door on the house but with beadboard panels and a window at the top so you can see who is coming to the door. Hoyt added that the overhang will go a long way toward protecting the wood of the house.

Judy Groppa asked if the doors were mahogany, but no, they will be the same as the doors on the Eldred residence which are regular French doors. Groppa had trouble when looking at the design as she didn't understand the river elevation. She asked about the entrance that is at an angle with a single post, inquiring whether the post was under the overhang and whether the brackets come out from the post and attach to the roof. She also asked what material the post was made of. The post will be cedar shakes.

Groppa also asked about the river elevation, whether there were two posts on the deck and whether they would also be cedar shakes. Hoyt stated that sheet A-1 shows the posts and they will be shingled with cedar shakes. Groppa asked if they were free standing posts and Hoyt advised they were.

Elaine Nollet liked that Hoyt put the same panels on the boathouse as the main house as it ties the two properties together and wanted the Chair to reconsider. Irene Bush thought the panels seemed more like the main house than the eyebrow window.

Hoyt showed the board a rendering done of the boathouse coming up the causeway on to the island, adding that this elevation coming on to the island is what you will see and looks similar to the house. Coming off the island, you don't see much of the boathouse even with all the leaves gone.

The Chair opened the hearing to the public at 7:20 pm, however, there were no questions or comments and the public hearing was closed.

The Chair asked the board if they had any questions or discussion. Groppa stated she doesn't like the extra paneling, believing it is too much for such a tiny building. The Chair stated his comments on the panel design stem from the fact that this site was originally for cod fish drying racks and New Castle is about fishing and this is one of the original boat houses. He would like to take a nod to

New Castle's heritage and have it look like a boat house and not a residence. 1 2 Groppa did state that there are boathouses with peaked roofs, which is where the eyebrow window is located. 3 4 5 Tom Maher wanted to confirm with the Chair that there is no historical 6 significance to the boathouse and Rowland stated that no, it is not that old. 7 8 The Chair stated that he would not vote for the application with the panels; Irene 9 Bush opined that it should be the panels or the eyebrow, but not both. 10 11 M/S/P Maher motioned to approve the plans as submitted with the elimination of the panels on the south elevation to be replaced with cedar shake shingles to match 12 the remainder of the structure, and that the applicant may use Azek or Boral inter-13 changeably. Irene Bush seconded. Elaine Nollet opposed; all others voted yes. 14 15 2. Public Hearing for Rejean and Rebecca Audet, 31 Oliver Street, to install a 16 garden shed and fence on south/rear side of property. Map 16 Lot 25 17 18 Guests: Rejean Audet, homeowner. 19 20 Mr. Audet passed around pictures of the plan showing where the fence is being 21 placed along with a photo of the shed. The shed will have cedar clapboards, 6 22 over 6 windows, architectural roofing, and PVC siding which mimics the house. 23 The design will also mimic the addition put on the house five years ago in terms 24 of color and design. There was a garage where the shed will be located but there 25 26 was no architectural or historical benefit to the garage and it has been knocked down. The fence in question mimics the Hughes' fence, which is two doors 27 down. 28 29 Chair Rowland asked if Mr. Audet was doing a staggard board fence to which he 30 replied yes but you cannot see through it. He added that they may be painting the 31 fence white. Judy Groppa asked how the doors open on the shed. Audet stated it 32 will have double doors and there is a small section of the shed which will be seen 33 when looking down the driveway. 34 35 36 Chair Rowland asked if the board had any questions. Tom Maher asked about the picture of the shed and whether the main house has a cupola on it. Audet 37 responded that there is no cupola on the home but that a neighbor also has one on 38 39 her shed and that someone would really have to look from the street to see it. 40 The Chair opened the hearing to the public at 7:35 pm but there were no 41 comments or questions and the hearing was closed to the public. 42 43 M/S/P 44 Elaine Nollet moved to accept the application for a garden shed and fence as 45 submitted; Maher seconded. All approved including the Chair.

 3. Public Hearing for Grant and Karina Drumheller, 91 Main Street, to remove one story rear porch and add a 17' x 20.5' addition with a 10'x 20' rear deck and steps. Replace window on second floor. Map 13 Lot 13

Guests: Ann Whitney, Architect.

Ann Whitney stated the site plan shows that this addition is set back quite a bit as there is 42' from the edge of the street to the edge of this rear addition, and coming into New Castle you may be able to get a glimpse as you go by. The house is right at the street, with the driveway on the right and the addition is coming off the driveway. The existing building is wider than 20.5' so the addition will be coming in from the building. Currently, there is a side entrance and one story screen porch that will be removed. The plan is to come into the house with steps running parallel to the house into the mud room, and to also access out the back of the addition to a 10' x 20' deck with wide stairs to connect to the back yard.

Whitney stated they would like the option of an oval window or eyebrow window but the Chair stated that if it is not visible from a public way, the board has no say on what they install. The Chair asked if it is completely invisible from the street and Whitney advised that yes, it was.

They have also gone to a six light French door instead of a single window on the back addition. The railings on the deck will be Azek and the vertical skirting will be painted.

On the left side elevation, the room will have two double hung windows, a crawl space under and the same detail on the deck. The skirt is vertical board and has spaces in between the boards. Whitney was asked what detail would be on the crawl space door and she replied it would probably be board with a V groove.

Judy Groppa asked Whitney about the foundation as she had mentioned that it was a stone foundation. Whitney stated the existing house foundation is brick and transitions to stone. She didn't propose any treatment to the foundation as you will not see the foundation from the street because the stairway into the mud room will block it. The foundation will be concrete but will be covered with deck & skirting so it will not be visible.

Architect Whitney stated they will use Marvin clad windows but it would be up to Peter Follansbee, the builder, whether to use composite or a combination of wood and Azek. Some places they will use Lifespan solid select which is a pine treated with mineral spirits and an oil based primer and paints beautifully.

Chair Rowland asked if the board had any questions. Elaine Nollet stated she really likes the design. The Chair opened the hearing to the public at 7:45 pm but there were no comments or questions.

M/S/P Tom Maher motioned to approve the plans as proposed; Irene Bush seconded. All were in favor including the Chair.

## 4. Approval of June 6, 2019 Minutes

Irene Bush motioned to approve the June 6, 2019 minutes as amended; Maher seconded. All approved.

## 5. Old Business

Mr. and Mrs. Bryan of 34 Wentworth Road, Map 18, Lot 64 advised they want to present their final phase at next month's HDC meeting. Mr. Bryan stated the garden shed in the back is in the way of the garage and they want to take it down and build a second bay on the garage that looks like the first but with a hip roof. They also wish to repair the second shed as it is falling apart. A renovation of the shed would push them into more approvals which they don't want to go through. The excavation of the driveway has created a need for retaining walls, some of which are in view of the street. They have two rock walls that will be visible, one of which is to line the driveway and they need to build a rock wall to contain the elevation change. Lastly, on the Feder side, they would like to put a rock wall instead of a fence, and back fill it in with dirt so they can have a level lawn. The Chair advised Mr. Bryan to bring in a materials list and a rendering of the property and the board will review it.

## 6. New Business

The Chair wanted to discuss Officers and elections but because the Vice Chair, Jeff Hughes, was not present, decided to wait until next month's meeting. Peter Reed advised the Chair that he wanted to step down so there is an opening for an alternate. It was asked whether a nominee had to live in the district and the Chair stated there was a good balance of members in the historic district and some were not. He also advised Judy Groppa that he would like to have her as a voting member.

Rowland advised that all the paperwork had been submitted by the Select Board to the Governors' Executive Council for the CLG grant but it has not yet gotten on their agenda because of the summer schedule. He also advised that the contractor has been very busy so there is no real rush.

Irene Bush motioned to adjourn; Judy Groppa seconded. All in favor.
