The Library's **2015 Summer Reading** Program was titled Great Island Discovery. Our kick-off event was held on June 24th with a visit from meteorologist Kevin Skarupa from WMUR-TV9. He talked about weather on the seacoast and about space. The children were particularly interested to learn that NASA sent its first spacecraft to Pluto in 2006. New Horizons spacecraft has been on a nine-year trek and is now sending back pictures of Pluto and its main moon Charon. The children are getting up-to-date information on WMUR-TV's website. On subsequent Wednesdays we hosted various activities and programs – Art Day, Perler Beads & Crafts, and Explore the Ocean Floor (with live sea animals). Our Summer Reading Program was generously sponsored again this year by former Superintendent George Cushing and the New Castle School Board.

In case you haven't already discovered ... we have a new library pass for the **Ogunquit Museum of American Art**. This is an extraordinary little museum overlooking the

In a recent "Town and City" magazine, there was an article on what is flushable. Raymond Gordon writes that "wipes" were once used on for babies' bottoms, now have expanded. Wipes are for every conceivable need. This product, poorly labeled, should not be flushed even when noted to only flush one or two wipes. These products cannot be treated by sewer or septic systems along with other items such as dental flow, paper towels, cigarette butts, tampons, condoms and cotton swabs. These items have potential to clog the system costing municipalities thousands of dollars to deal with this problem. Waste water systems are designed for the "3P's" (pee, poop, and paper).

Hazardous Waste Day Schedule Change

Voters passed a warrant article at the May 2015 Town Meeting that allows for a change, and some significant cost savings, in the process for collecting and disposing of trash for the Town.

Part of that change will be the elimination of one of the two Household Hazardous Waste Days.

In the past HHWD's occurred in May at the Public Works facility in Hampton, NH and August or September at the Highway Garage in Brentwood, NH. New Castle residents have historically found the Hampton facility to be more convenient with approximately 20 cars per year dropping materials at Hampton. Over the past 4 years, just 2 cars have dropped materials at Brentwood.

For that reason, and with the change in collecting and disposing of trash, New Castle will now offer just one Household Hazardous Waste Day in the Spring.

A notice for the next collection date will be communicated sometime in early 2016.



<u>Living History Event at former World</u> War II Coastal Artillery fort

Saturday, August 15 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Local living historians bring history to life to commemorate the 70th anniversary of WWII, 1939-1945. Camp setups, military vehicles, field offices, home front and military displays allow the public to interact and learn about life for men and women during the war. Reenactors will be dressed in period military and civilian attire to help represent all branches of the military as well as those who supported the war effort at home.

Fort Stark State Historic Site, 211 Wild Rose Lane in New Castle, will be hosting this outdoor display. Ample free parking, guided historic trail, small, unsupervised beach and the displays in the Visitor Center will also all be available. Admission is free but donations are gratefully accepted.

Please visit with caution as this is a former military installation. Beware of the dangers of unprotected stairs, high walls, rough ground and slippery rocks. Adult supervision of children is required. The Visitor Center is not handicapped accessible.

"GREEN WASTE DAY"

The green waste dumpster will be available to island residents one <u>Saturday</u> each month during the 2015 growing season. The dumpster is located at the Common next to the library.

Green waste volunteers will be on duty from 8 AM to 11AM. No afterhours dumping is permitted. Because plastic bags are not biodegradable, these must be emptied and reclaimed. Using disposable paper bagging keeps clothes clean and dispositions cheerful.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION UPDATES

The Commission has been addressing the problem of invasive plants on the Island for many years, and is now completing an experimental study aimed at reducing/eliminating the invasive plant Phragmites (or Common Reed) with the assistance of the Rockingham County Conservation District (RCCD). Phragmites, a highly invasive plant, is often found adjacent to wetlands and salt marshes. The study is using a solarization technique to stop future rhizome (root) growth and spread of *Phragmites* in the Lavenger Creek saltmarsh. A presentation will be offered on the results of this study, and will include information on the health of the Lavenger Creek salt marsh. This presentation is planned for Saturday afternoon OCTOBER **24**TH (**2-3:30**) at the Pump House at Quarterdeck Lane (with Sunday afternoon as a rain date). Dr. Dave Burdick, Interim Director, Jackson Estuarine Laboratory TIDES MS Program Coordinator at UNH will provide information on salt marsh health and what landowners can do to help preserve it. Information on the presentation will also be found on the Town of New Castle website, and flyers will be posted in town.

In addition, during the next few weeks RCCD will assist the Commission in reviewing the Town's 2005 Wetlands Study to review/update any changes in wetland health and the health of adjacent buffers. Wetland buffers are vegetated upland transition zones that not only enhance the quality of the wetland resources, but also "buffer" the sensitive aquatic habitats from human activities. On-site reviews will be completed in September and October by RCCD staff, Mike Cuomo, CWS, CSS who will

complete the evaluation. This may result in changes and/or an addendum to the 2005 study, as well as other protection/restoration recommendations.

Funding for these activities have been provided by the NH Department of Agriculture Markets and Food, IPM program, and in part by a grant from the Piscataqua Region Estuaries Partnership (PREP), as authorized by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's National Estuary Program.
