CAUSEWAY PROJECT Project Scheduled for Spring 2012

Residents should be aware that Route 1B, along the causeway between New Castle and Portsmouth, will undergo reconstruction work during the Spring of 2012. Actual construction dates have not yet been set but the work will require that the causeway section of Route 1B be closed for approximately 2 weeks. Alternating one-way traffic will be allowed during one week before and one week after the 2 week closure period.

During the 2 week closure period the only route on and off the island for vehicles weighing less than 15 tons will be the bridge by the hotel.

Vehicles weighing more than 15 tons will be accommodated at certain times during the day through the causeway construction zone.

More information about this project will be available in the coming months.

EMERGENCY GENERATOR SAFETY

If you own a back-up generator to supply your home or business with power during an outage, it is critical for your safety and the safety of our employees that your equipment is properly installed.

Improperly installed generators can cause fires and feed electricity back into the power lines, endangering the lives of your neighbors, the public and PSNH line workers. In addition, you may be liable for damage or injury to people and property that may result from an improperly installed or operated emergency generator.

Disconnect First!

It is a requirement that a transfer switch be installed to prevent back feeding electricity into the PSNH system. A transfer switch ensures that the PSNH power supply coming into your home or business is disconnected before you connect and operate your generator. Likewise, when returning to PSNH services, a transfer switch will make sure your generator is disconnected before reconnecting to the PSNH supply. PSNH recommends that each customer consult with a licensed electrician regarding installation of an appropriate switch.

- NEVER OPERATE GENERATORS
 INSIDE of your home, garage, basement, crawl space, carport, enclosed/partially enclosed space, or near doors and windows.
- STORE FUEL FOR GENERATORS IN PROPERLY LABELED CONTAINERS kept away from living areas and fuel-burning appliances.
- CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS
 WITH BATTERY BACKUP SHOULD BE
 USED in nearby enclosed spaces to monitor
 levels
- MAKE SURE THAT EXTENSION CORDS USED WITH GENERATORS ARE RATED FOR THE LOAD, are free of cuts or worn insulation, have three prongs and preferable one with a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI).

On **Tuesday, February 7, 2012 at 5:30 pm, Loons**, the beautiful black and white speckled water birds unique to northeastern waterways will be the topic of a dinner meeting at the Wentworth Country Club. Harry Vogel, Senior Biologist/Exec. Director of the Loon Preservation Committee in Moultonborough, NH will talk about the status of the common loon in the state. He will discuss loon counts, how to decipher the meaning of their different calling sounds, nesting patterns and the danger of lead sinkers and boats.

Loons can be seen on our seacoast in the winter, returning in the summer to lakes such as Winnipesaukee when it unfreezes in the spring. Loons can be distinguished at a distance from other water fowl by the length of time they can stay under water, up to 40 seconds.

NEW CASTLE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The library has been busy with vibrant activities and programs. On October 25th, the library hosted its third annual Flashlight Halloween Story time. Thirty children attended in costumes and pajamas, with their flashlights, to read Halloween stories by the light of jack-olanterns. On November 15th, local author Brendan DuBois discussed writing in the Macomber Room - thank you to Mary Rauh for scheduling this event. On December 14th, the library welcomed the community to its annual Holiday Open House to share holiday cheer, cookies, eggnog & apple cider. Our adult library book club continues to meet the first Wednesday of each month – I have a 2012 book list available for anyone interested in attending. Additionally, the library has three children's book groups that meet monthly. On Thursdays the students at MHT visit the library, and I visit the school the first Friday of each month for a book talk with the students and staff.

An update on the NH State Library interlibrary loan system - The Portsmouth Herald reported on January 10th that, "The state's interlibrary loan service will likely end up unchanged, which comes as a major relief to library workers throughout the region." On November 23rd, I sent 62 petition signatures in support of this program to Michael York, the NH State Librarian. Patrons were vocal about the importance of this service, which allows libraries throughout the state to share resources. This is an incredibly cost-effective, efficient method of sharing resources, therefore reducing cost of materials in every library and expanding materials available to patrons. Last year the four van system transported more than 800,000 items at a cost of 44 cents per item.

If you received a Nook or Kindle for Christmas, please stop the library for a NH Downloadable books library card. Our library participates in the

state consortium and we have access to more than **4,000** audiobook titles and **1,000** e-book titles.

In the past month the library received donations of high quality used books. Used books are always for sale in our back room at a price of \$1 for hardcovers and \$.50 for paperbacks. And, as always, we would love your BOOK DONATIONS! This is a wonderful ongoing fundraiser for the library.

A reminder for all walkers, joggers and cyclists: When two or more are engaged in walking, jogging or cycling, please remember to stay in a single line, especially when encountering any vehicular traffic.

SAFEPATH WENTWORTH ROAD

The power outages caused by the 2011 snow storm in October, prevented PSNH from moving a utility pole that was in the path of the granite curbstone which has to be laid before final blacktop can be put down.

A base layer of blacktop has been applied but the job is incomplete in the eyes of NHDOT. Until the job is complete, the town will not be responsible for the path.

The path will be closed until Spring or when paving plants will again be in operation and able to supply material to complete the path.

NHDOT has told us that funding for the path is not in jeopardy and that they will advise us in writing of that fact.

It is the town's opinion that the contractor did a great job in constructing the path and, with a base coat of asphalt, the path looks like it is ready for use, but it is not. The town will not take ownership and, therefore, will not provide any maintenance during the winter or until the path is completed.

Signs at each end of the path have been erected to advice people that the path is not in use. Please communicate this fact to anyone in your travels.

HISTORIC SOCIETY PRESENTATION

On Tuesday, April 10 at 7pm, the Historic Society will present a talk by Neil Novello who will speak about the Portsmouth Naval Prison. This is open to the public.

During his 25-year career, Mr. Novello has worked with people ranging from a MacArthur genius grant winning choreographer, Liz Lerman (*The Shipyard Dance*), to a black velvet art dealer in the US-Mexico border town (*Black Velvet Art*), to the die-hard practitioners of dirt track stock car racing in Mississippi (*Dirt: Thrills, Chills and Spills*), to immigrants and their experiences (*America: The New Immigrants*).

In 1998, Mr. Novello formed The Iguana Division, Ltd. (changed to *The Iguana Division, LLC in* 2009) to produce family biographies, documentaries and institutional video communication tools.

DOG INFORMATION

All dogs over 3 months old must be license for the current year between January 1 and April 30^{th.}

Owners must restrain their dogs from running at large within the town.

First Offense - \$25.00 Second Offense - \$50.00 Third Offense - \$75.00

All dogs must be kept on a leash while in the Great Island Common.

Fine up to \$100

No dogs on in the Great Island Common between May 15th and September 15th.

Fine up to \$100

No dogs on New Castle Beach between May 15th and September 15th.

Fine up to \$100

All dog excrement on public property or private property of another must be picked up and disposed of immediately.

Fine up to \$50.00

No dogs allowed at Fort Stark or Fort Constitution.

Please make sure that you clean up after your dog, and don't be shy if you see dog owners or dogwalkers who don't comply with this request! You may report any violations to the New Castle Police Department, 603-436-3800.
