RESIDENT STICKERS

All property owners/residents are entitled to resident stickers. These stickers allow free vehicle admission to the Great Island Common and to park in areas around town designated for "permit parking only."

Residents

Full time residents/property owners are entitled to have up to *three* stickers. For each sticker the resident will be required to bring in a copy of their vehicle registration that is registered in their name and with the Town of New Castle. Additional stickers can be purchased for \$80.

Non residents/property owners

Each non-resident property owner will be allowed one sticker. Non-residents will be asked to provide their vehicle registration which must be registered to them.

Renters

Renters will be treated the same as residents and will be required to provide a copy of their lease or a letter from the landlord to show proof of residency.

Decals will be issued on a yearly basis and the Town asks that all previous stickers be removed. Decals must be attached to the outside window on the driver's side of the vehicle.

If you are unable to come into town hall during office hours, please send a copy of your vehicle registration along with a self addressed stamped envelope and we will be happy to mail your resident sticker.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

I have had several calls as well as discussions when I am at the Post Office from residents of town who were surprised on how high their last sewer and water bill was. They wanted to know how the water and sewer are calculated. Even though we have had this posted in past Island Items, I felt it necessary, because of the calls, to put this in once again.

Bills are issued every fourth month: April, August, and December. One Unit equals 748 gallons. A "minimum charge" of 20 "units" applies to all accounts. As of this date, the minimum charge for 20 units of water is \$41.80 (20 X \$2.09), and for 20 units of sewer it is \$232.40 (20 X \$11.62). Every unit beyond the minimum is charged at the same rate for both water and sewer.

Please always check for leaky faucets, or flapper valves that are not closing on your toilets. We have blue dye tablets available at the town office free of charge to put in the back of your toilet to see if it is leaking. Please stop by the Town Hall and ask Pam Cullen for the dye tablets. Also, wait until you have **full** loads before running your dishwasher or washing machine. Testing your toilets and making minor changes to your washing habits can save you money!

We are still discussing the possibilities with the city of Portsmouth to take over the town's sewer and water system. We will keep you posted of the progress.

A MESSAGE TO DOG OWNERS

During the past several months the New Castle Public Works Department has picked up an average of 20 bags of dog waste per week that have been left around the Island, mostly at the Great Island Common.

Signs have been in place for a number of years in various locations around the Island and the Common that direct dog owners to be responsible for removing any dog waste.

Removing dog waste does not mean that the Town will be responsible for the removal of dog waste. Dog owners are responsible for this task.

Neglecting this duty will jeopardize the use of the Common by any and all dog owners.

Please abide by the rules of claiming and disposing of your dog's waste at anytime, anywhere on the Island.



FROM USCG – PORTSMOUTH HARBOR STATION

Hello neighbors, I'm Chief Dave Andreesen from the Coast Guard Station. What a privilege it is for me to serve as the Officer in Charge of this outstanding Coast Guard unit in such a close-knit community. I'm from New England, so this is home to me. I remember standing on the shores of The Common's a number of years ago and looking over at Fort Constitution, and saying that I wanted to be the unit commander someday. Well here I am, and I couldn't be happier. My 16 years in the Coast Guard has kept me planted pretty much right here in the Northeast. I served at units in New Bedford, Gloucester, Newburyport, and Long Island, NY.

The 34 active duty men and women of this unit come from all over the country, but a good majority of them are from the Northeast as well. The average age of our crew is 23 years old. I find it amazing that these young people, day in and day out, are carrying out the Coast Guard mission with impeccable results. No other organization gives its people so much responsibility at such a young age. We also have a large contingent of reserve members. The reserves live and work in the community, and work here one weekend a month. Their main job is to train for deployment anywhere around the globe.

Dating back to the days when this country was first settled, the first and foremost mission of this service is search and rescue. We continually train on a daily basis, perfecting our craft and ensuring our crews are ready at all times to answer the call for assistance from mariners in distress. We also act as the police on the water, as our law enforcement mission has us regulating commercial fishing boats to recreational boats. We are also charged with homeland security; from routine patrols of the river to safely guiding submarines into the Shipyard to providing security for tankers making their way up river. When our crew isn't out on the boats, they're back here training, maintaining the boats, the station's buildings, and the grounds.

I know many of you frequent the base, and take that "blue line" walk out to the old Fort for some million-dollar views. Next time you walk through, stop and say hi to one of our crewmembers who may be walking across the parking lot. We'd love to hear from you.

2012 in REVIEW: Residents Passing

Jim Cerny, for the Cemetery Trustees
The year 2012 saw the passing of a number of
New Castle residents, demonstrating remarkable
longevity in many cases. Residency is defined in
various ways and this list is intended to be
inclusive. For example, some people only become
residents in death, living elsewhere but buried in a
family plot, while others are long-time residents
who move to assisted living in other towns as they
get older and are not counted as New Castle
residents by the State.

The State of New Hampshire counted 10 people as New Castle residents at death in 2012, with the place of death either in Portsmouth or New Castle.

We had eleven burials in New Castle cemeteries this year, which is more than in recent years, about half in Riverside and half in Oceanside. Dates shown are the month/year of burial, not necessarily when they died.

This list includes name, age, and burial information if buried in New Castle.




