NEW CASTLE SIGN

There is interest in the Town to add a line to the existing New Castle town sign (see attached photo) located in the center island by the Riverside Cemetery. The added line would be: "SITE OF THE FIRST SHOTS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION".

Official proof has been provided that Ft. William and Mary (later renamed Ft. Constitution) was the site of a raid on December 14-15, 1774, 4 months before the battle in Lexington and Concord in April, 1775.

Options being considered include the added line to be located at the bottom of the existing sign or the creation of a new sign. Suggested wording for the sign is being reviewed.

It has also been requested that whatever sign is agreed upon, a duplicate sign be erected at the Ryeend of the island on land owned by the hotel (which has given permission for this sign).

The Town is interested in any feedback about the proposed changes to this sign. You may attend a Select Board meeting or send your comments to any of the Select Board members.

New Castle Select Board Meeting-October 17, 2022

Town Landing, Hart's Cove, Lower Wentworth Road

Cracking wise a few years ago, one resident asked another, "Why is there no town landing at the town landing?" The wiser of the two residents, Dave Borden, after a few years' thought, approached the wisecracker, Charlie Tarbell, a said, "let's see what the selectmen think". Last December they approached the selectmen with the idea and were encouraged to look into it. A meeting with a marine contractor produced a proposal for a pier and float system about at the center of the waterfront on the property known as the "Town Landing", between the Hart House on Hart's Cove and the UNH pier.

The, now dated, proposal came in at just under \$200 thousand dollars.

New Castle is an island community surrounded by water. Other than the kayak launch on Goat Island and a few other obscure access points, there is no truly public access to the water. It is quite common, if not universal, for towns and cities all along the coast to have a "Town Pier". The vision is to have a fairly robust landing for transients and residents (with a sticker) to tie their dingy, land their boat temporarily for a crew change or for residents to board the Gundalow or small passenger vessel for a special event. The Select Board asked that the townsfolk be informed of the idea and see if it is worth pursuing. If there is interest, perhaps there could be a vote on the proposal at the next **Town Meeting.**

On September 26, I had the great honor to present the Boston Post Cane to Phyllis Crosby, recognizing her as the oldest resident in New Castle at the age of 93.

For over a century, it has been the practice to designate the oldest resident in hundreds of New England towns as the holder of the Boston Post Cane. The publisher of The Boston Post newspaper, Edwin Grozier, started this practice in 1909 as an advertising promotion. He gave out 700 canes to towns (not cities) in NH, ME, MA and RI to be held by the oldest resident while they lived. Until 1930 they went to the oldest male resident. The newspaper went out of business in 1956 but some towns keep the tradition alive.

The canes were crafted by J. F. Fradley Co., using African ebony, with a 14 karat gold head and a ferrule at the tip. The head is engraved as "presented by The Boston Post to the oldest citizen of (name of town) to be transmitted." For many years, towns actually loaned their cane but that led to the loss of canes over the years. Now it is typical to keep the cane on display and present a proclamation.

At the main entrance to the New Castle Town Hall, on the immediate right-hand wall, is a case which holds the cane and information about the most recent honorees.



Your library has many books and opportunities to help you "look good". In addition to an up-to-date collection of books and other resources, the library has a wide variety of programming. We have ongoing programs including knitting group, cookbook club, library book group, men's book group (meets every other month), bridge, adult art classes, community reads, learn-to-play Mahjong, winter discussion series... In September we added drop-in Mahjong on Wednesdays from 3-5pm.

The library and recreation committee have teamed up to co-sponsor a Healthy Living series. This program focuses on health and well-being and includes exercise and informational programs. We started with Strength & Conditioning and Introduction to Yoga – both have been extremely popular. Most of us work harder when we exercise with a group, and it is certainly a lot more fun. In September we launched a walking group on Thursday mornings and then we walked the Great Island 5K together. This winter we will host a series of presentations and discussions related to healthy living.

And for our young families, we have story times on Thursday and Saturday mornings, 1000 Books Before Kindergarten, after school book groups, and holiday programs.

Work on three Safepath projects is well underway.

The TAP Grant - this path between Beach Hill Road and Pit Lane, had a temporary setback due to Covid but is once again underway. This summer the lilac shrubs crowding 1B were removed. CMA Engineering is in the late stages of determining the safest route between Beach Hill Road and Pit Lane. They are working closely with the homeowners on that stretch. The granite ledge blocking sight lines at Shaw's Circle will be removed with the owner's permission. We are projecting that very soon CMA will make a presentation to the Select Board. Soon after the Community will have a chance to review and comment on the plans.

The Commons - A conceptual design for the path linking Rodgers Blvd and Beach Hill Road has been sent to CMA engineering for drawings that can be used to price out the project. We anticipate getting those drawing this fall. This project includes removing, relocating and replacing the existing fence. Because of a shortage of engineers, and long lead times, it is difficult to forecast a construction time. As more details become available, we will keep you posted.

Pit Lane to the Causeway - A public survey was completed indicating overwhelming support for continuing to create Safepaths along 1B. We have engaged Ironwood Design to develop conceptual drawings. These drawing will help us start the conversation about what we want and what is feasible. They should be available this fall.

We will continue to update the Safepath page on the Town's web site as more information becomes available. Thank you to everyone has donated to Safepath. Your donations allow us to move forward.

The Missions Committee originally designated Disabled American Veterans as its mission for this month. Mother nature has dictated that we must put off the DAV until December in order to deal with hurricanes in Puerto Rico and Florida. The United Church of Christ has launched an emergency appeal for hurricanes in 2022 including Fiona, Ian, and those still to come. This fund specifically covers the damage in Puerto Rico and Florida and has been chosen as our new mission for November.

You may be interested to learn that two of our missions earlier this year have been serving in both locations. In July we supported World Central Kitchen (WCK). Support to Direct Relief followed in August. WCK has served more than 310,000 meals to communities affected by Hurricane Fiona. Chef Jose Andres was in Florida before the hurricane arrived and has had a similar impact there.

Direct Relief was able to support Puerto Rico after Fiona very quickly from their staff and stockpile of goods designed to support the Caribbean area. Their help included medical supplies and equipment, food and water, personal items, and electricity generation equipment. They provided similar support in Florida after Hurricane Ian.

Work on our lovely Museum Woodland Garden continues. Board members Jennie Schwartz and Patty Frawley have undertaken the extreme task of cleaning out years of debris and undergrowth, gardening and landscaping the lot of land. They have been capably helped by Mary Kennedy, an active volunteer on the committee. Nancy Borden also serves on the committee.

In support of the garden project, we have begun a fundraising campaign to raise the money we need to complete the garden. Before our letters even went out, we had raised \$20,000 from some very generous town and Board members. Since the letters have gone out, we are now up to \$41,000 with more donations coming in every day. Please consider how beautiful the garden is going to be for the town and donate generously. We are trying to reach a goal of \$75,000 so we can complete all the necessary work, including rebuilding the stonewall along the street. Fall plants will be going in soon!



The NCHS is also hard at work putting together a robust celebration of the Town's 400th celebration. The events will in-

clude historical reenactments on the Commons, a colonial dance that same night, summer village walking

tours and the publication of <u>A History of New Castle</u> by J. Dennis Robinson. These events will be in conjunction with the NC Garden Club's walking tour and a 4th of July parade. Stay tuned for possible other events to celebrate this momentous year.

To help educate and remember the glorious history of New Castle, the museum has presented a lively slate of programs starting in April and running to the current day. We led off with a dynamic presentation by Dr. Alexandra Martin of Strawbery Banke. Alix enlightened us about Abenaki culture. In May, Dr. Emerson 'Tad' Baker taught us about the now world-famous Demers collection of pottery, found off the coast of New Castle and featuring many beautiful pottery pieces. In June, our program featured Kevin Gardner, the stone wall guy. Kevin specializes in the region's famous stone walls and even built one while he was speaking. In June, our wildly popular village walking tours began and ran through September. These proved to be as popular this year as they were last year. We will run them again next year. The tours featured Town Historian Carol White, and several of our board members as the tour guides. In August, board member Jim Cerny presented a talk called "If Walls Could Talk," focusing on the beautiful summer mansions that once graced Rose Hill Lane. Jane Sweeny helped design the talk. In September we held a members-only soiree at the Anchor house [or George Walton tavern] in New Castle. This event, featuring author J. Dennis Robinson, hosted over 60 members. Dennis is writing The History of New Castle, due out in 2023. Please join the NCHS so you can attend events like these. October brought us the program called "Tripping Over Cemeteries," about the cemeteries of New Castle, given by Town Historian Carol White. November will be our annual meeting, topped by the Island's 60-year-olds talking about growing up in New Castle. We strongly recommend our programs and hope to see you all there! Programs are run at the museum; however, we also offer the Zoom option. See our website for the Zoom link. It is on the home page.

On October 20th, the Maude Trefethen School visited the museum. The children studied the panel maps featured on the museum's walls. Nancy Borden presented a slide show on the history of New Castle. We then treated the kids to a scavenger hunt. It ended with the awarding of a cookie [or two] for all who found the items hidden away for the hunt.

Following our November program, the NCHS takes the winter off. Our programs resume in April of 2023 and promise to be another great slate of topics of interest to our members and the general public. Got an idea for a program? Let us know.

Attention continues to be drawn to our now worldfamous Demers collection of pottery found in the shipwrecks in Harts Cove and off Salamander Point. Dr. Alix Martin, UNH and Strawbery Banke archeologist, brought her Lab Methods Field School to the museum. Students helped catalog the artifacts and enjoyed being around such an incredible collection. Dr. Bob Barth, English stoneware expert, visited the museum and spent time with archaeologist and historian Dr. Tad Baker and Dr. Alix Martin. He identified a near-complete English dry-bodied stoneware teapot from the Demers collection. These are fancy pieces imitating Chinese Yiping wares, which are extremely rare in American archeology sites, especially in such good condition. Barth says it was made in Staffordshire, around 1765. A beauty! Merry Abbott Outlaw, Senior Jamestown curator and editor of the acclaimed book: Ceramics in America, visited the museum for two days and was amazed by our remarkable collection. She helped Drs Baker and Martin in cataloging our artifacts. She also invited members to bring in unusual items from their own homes which she then identified and dated.

We will soon be launching our membership drive for 2023. We hope you will join or renew and be part of the incredible history of New Castle.

If you have not yet donated to our fund-raiser for the Museum Woodland Garden, please do so and help us reach our goal so we can complete what promises to be beautiful space that will be a treat for the museum, the Historic District and the whole town!

Happy fall to all! Over the past several months we have had an increased number of emergency calls for strokes and heart-related conditions. The following, developed in conjunction with our partners at Portsmouth Regional Hospital, is a brief look at recognizing the symptoms of these conditions and what you can do to take action.



Stroke

Reduced blood flow to an artery in your brain. Could be from a blockage or a clot (Ischemic Stroke) or from a ruptured blood vessel (Hemorrhagic Stroke). Reduced blood flow affects the ability for the brain tissue that is fed by these arteries to function properly. This presentation can be a subtle numbness in one extremity or a more severe inability to move an arm or leg, or difficulty speaking. Untreated, strokes can very quickly lead to irreversible disability. Fast arrival to an acute care hospital within 4 hours of symptom onset gives the best options for treatment. TIME IS BRAIN. CALL 911 without delay.



Minutes count- know the symptoms. Call 911 and have your medication list ready.

ACS (Acute Coronary Syndrome) or "Heart Attack / Chest Pain"

Reduced blood flow to the arteries on the outside of the heart muscle. Reduced blood flow affects heart function and can result in various symptoms including, but not only, pain in the chest. As reduced blood flow continues, the heart muscle loses its ability to function and this can result in the inability to pump blood to other organs, such as the brain, kidneys and lungs, causing additional symptoms like confusion, heart palpitations and shortness of breath. CALL 911!



Sepsis

Sepsis has also been known as "blood poisoning." Any kind of infection can develop into sepsis if left untreated. Some common causes are things like: Wounds that are not healing, painful, swollen, red or oozing, urinary tract infections, respiratory infections like pneumonia, etc. Please seek help right away if you or a loved one may have an infection and any combination of the following:

Temperature- higher or lower than normal.

Confusion, dizziness or lightheadedness.


Rapid heart rate or feeling like heart is racing.

Shortness of breath or breathing faster than normal. Severe pain in focused area.

Boats and Trailer Storage at The Commons:

~ Please Make Sure Your Boat, RV/Camper Application Has Been Filled Out ~

The residents of New Castle are permitted to store their trailers in the summer (2nd Saturday in May till the 2nd Sunday in September. The boats/RV'S can then be stored from the 2nd Saturday in September until the 1st day of June. Residents are **required** to fill out applications for trailers and boats/RVs, and to let the office know when the they will arrive at the Common. These forms are available on our Town Website, and can be dropped off or mailed with all valid identification included with application.

This spring the Common had 30 plus trailers with only a few applications thus causing hours of work to search for owners, as many do not put current-colored stickers on for easy identification. The only way we can find who owns the trailer is by plate number. Applications can print forms from the town's website and mail in with fee and we will mail you back a sticker. We are asking residents to please come do applications for trailers in spring and boats/RVs in the fall before they are stored. Also ask that residents adhere to dates of removal as in the spring the town uses the boat storage area for school buses that come to the Common. This was quite a problem this spring with boats not being removed timely & the dates required as such.

**There are two storage forms, one for boats/RVs and one for trailers to be done every year when storing at the Common. In the past, we tried to combine the forms but that did not work out. Copies of current registrations are required along with proof of insurance need to be presented with the application of storage.

The cost of Boat Storage: \$6.00 a ft.

The cost of Trailer Storage: \$4.00 a ft.
