TO NEW CASTLE PROPERTY OWNERS USING MUNICIPAL WATER AND/OR SEWER

For the past year or so, water and sewer bills have risen so dramatically that the New Castle Public Works Board and Select Board have been exploring ways to mitigate these increases.

As New Castle is a water and sewer customer of Portsmouth and due to the federally mandated requirements that Portsmouth upgrade it's sewer facilities, New Castle will continue to bear it's share of the cost of this upgrade.

A reduction in minimum usage charges for New Castle property owners has been reviewed and discussed at length. It was determined that minimum usage charges will continue for now.

As water and sewer charges will likely continue to increase, the Town has recently begun discussions with the City of Portsmouth to explore the economics and potential benefits of conveying all of the Town's water and sewer systems to Portsmouth.

The discussions with Portsmouth are in the early stages but please know that the Town is aware of the continuing burden of water and sewer charge increases and that these charges have significant impacts on property owners budgets.

We will keep property owners informed of the progress of these discussions.

GREAT ISLAND GARDEN CLUB

DIG WE MUST! SAVE THE DATE...

New Castle...Greater Island Garden Club (GIGC) members are digging all over the island of New Castle. They're not looking for ancient artifacts. They are gathering plant treasures for the GIGC Plant sale on Saturday, May 14 at the Recreation Building adjacent to The Commons on Wentworth Road in New Castle. Hours are from 8:30 am to 1 pm. Traditionally, gardeners begin gathering at 8 am or earlier to ensure they don't miss an exotic garden treasure.

The unique draw of this plant sale is that most plants have already wintered over in New Castle's blustery winds, making their chances of survival in buyers' yards close to 90%, the club estimates.

Another attraction for gardeners and non-gardeners alike is the free advice one gets from master gardener members. The experts can be identified by their flower hats or hair garlands and will be waiting to guide and counsel visitors. Efficiency comes into play as well. Plants are grouped according to the light and soil conditions a gardener has in her/his yard, i.e. full SHADE, full SUN or SUN/SHADE designating the most favorable growing conditions for each plant. Plant categories, such as lilies, Solomon's seal and ferns plus landscaping plants featuring trees and bushes are grouped in different sections.


A relatively new area features only succulents, which, with warming climate changes, are a popular choice. They are planted in special small handmade troughs of tuffa, made concrete and other secret ingredients. To be au currant, a gardener these days needs to display a succulent pot, brought inside to winter.

Another new feature this year is the "Everything Except the Kitchen Sink" section, which will feature unusual combinations of plants and containers. For instance tomato plants will be growing in tomato cans with a picture of tomatoes. Old cooking pots will have ferns dripping over the edge, all of which would be wonderful gifts, guaranteed to being smiles to the recipient.

An old but incredibly popular area of the sale is the Garden Treasures section. Contents vary each year and have included things as diverse as garden furniture sets complete with umbrella, statuary, unusual urns and flower pots, window boxes and even garden gnomes.

Finally, there will be a silent auction section which features flower paintings, gardening services and exotic plants. Guests put down bids prior to the winners being announced at the end of the sale. You do not have to be present to win. Purchases at GIGC Plant Sale will be used to purchase the flowers and other greenery which the club plants at the New Castle Post Office, Town Hall, Church, Library and Recreation Center. These plantings are entirely designed, purchased, planted, watered and weeded by members of the GIGC and local school children.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY PRESENTATION

On Tuesday, May 15 at 7pm, the Historic Society will present a second talk by Neil Novello who will speak about the Portsmouth Naval Prison. This presentation will be held at the Rec. Center. Please note the change of venue. This is open to the public.

During his 25-year career, Mr. Novello has worked with people ranging from a MacArthur genius grant winning choreographer, Liz Lerman (*The Shipyard Dance*), to a black velvet art dealer in the US-Mexico border town (*Black Velvet Art*), to the die-hard practitioners of dirt track stock car racing in Mississippi (*Dirt: Thrills, Chills and Spills*), to immigrants and their experiences (*America: The New Immigrants*).

In 1998, Mr. Novello formed The Iguana Division, Ltd. (changed to *The Iguana Division, LLC in* 2009) to produce family biographies, documentaries and institutional video communication tools.

We are sorry for any patrols that came to the April 10th presentation of Mr. Novello, and were turned away. Due to the large crowd, the Historical Society had to turn people away in order to meet the fire safety code. So those of you who missed that talk, now have another chance.

Church Proposes a Gazebo

The New Castle Congregational Church is proposing to partner with members of the community to construct a gazebo on the side lawn of the church for the benefit of the entire community. Local residents will help build the structure, and the whole community will be encouraged to use the gazebo. This could be a gathering place for residents of all ages, where conversation, art, music, or children's programs would be just part of what might happen here. Why now? In 2006 New Castle Congregational Church signed a contract with T-Mobile to put a cell-phone antenna in the church tower. In order to improve the reception, a fiberglass replica replaced the wooden belfry cap. Since T-Mobile needed a license from the FCC to operate the antenna, Section 106 of the Historic Preservation Act mandated a review by the NH Division of Historical Resources. They approved the project with the condition that the original belfry cap be removed, restored, and maintained until its replacement on the tower when the contract ends. Preservation Timber Framing, Inc. of Berwick, Maine has restored the cap, and it is now ready to be returned to the church property. We propose that the belfry cap be used as part of a useful structure for the church and community, a gazebo whose crowning feature is the original cap. The gazebo would be constructed in a way that would allow the original cap to be replaced on the steeple at the end of the cell-tower contract. The fiberglass replica could then be placed on the gazebo.

The church envisions the gazebo to be a joint project with the community and is actively seeking people to help us realize our goal. For more information please call Leonard Seagren at 765-6249 or Etoile Holzaepfel at 436-3676.
