Library activities at MHT –

In case you didn't know ... I wear two hats at the library. In addition to being the Director of the public library, I am also the school librarian. As always, it has been a wonderful year working with the school. The first Friday of each month I present a Book Talk to the students and staff. It is always a delight to see the students' enthusiasm as they file into the multipurpose room at 8am to learn about new books. I bring about 40 books each month and talk a little about each of them. After my presentation the students choose a book to checkout. I am always thankful to have Ms. Zacharias there to help broker deals when there is a rush for a particularly exciting book.

Over the winter I worked with Mr. Purcell for a series of book discussions in second and third grades. We read classics, contemporary fiction, and biographies where we discussed "big ideas", characters, important information, talking points, and finding evidence to support our opinions. I was so impressed by the thoughtful understanding and insights of these young students.

In March, Mr. Robinson and I had a great time discussing *From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler* with the fourth, fifth, and sixth graders. In this classic Claudia Kincaid decides to run away to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. This is a story of self-discovery that turns into a mystery that kept us enthralled to the very end. E.L. Konigsburg won the Newbery Medal for excellence in American children's literature in 1968 for this book.

Kindergarten and first grade visited the library on Thursdays after gym in March and April. We learned about the library, how to find "just right" books, and fiction versus nonfiction choices. In an effort to encourage children to be curious and engaged readers we read a story each week and then went on a hunt for related fiction and nonfiction books to explore areas of interest that had been sparked by the story.

What's Happening at the Library -

The library introduced a new program in March - *Introduction to Bridge Fundamentals*. Dick Spaulding is leading ten eager learners in the art of playing bridge. With much guidance and great humor, Dick has this spirited, overconfident group already playing hands of bridge. Many thanks to Dick for leading this group, providing written material each week for easy review, and for bringing a great spirit to this endeavor!

On April 6th the library was fortunate to host Ann Beattie and her talk *140 Years at Sea: The Oceanic Hotel on Star Island*. We had more than 50 community members who attended and enjoyed Ann's lively and informative presentation on the history of the Oceanic Hotel. Many thanks to Star Island Corporation, NH Preservation Alliance, Five Maples, and Isles of Shoals Steamship Company for sponsoring this program.

On April 27th the library hosted a bus trip to *John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum*. We were greeted by a museum docent who provided an introduction and then participants were free to explore for a couple of hours. Carl's Take Away Café provided delicious boxed lunches for the bus ride home. It was a wonderful, hassle-free opportunity to explore the Kennedy Library and share the experience with friends!

The 2016 Library Summer Reading Program *The Four R's: Reduce Reuse Recycle & Read* begins on Wednesday, June 22nd with Lyndsay and Her Puppet Pals. We will meet on Wednesdays at 3pm for programs, arts & crafts, games, and activities. All ages welcome!

WATER & SEWER COMMISSION

As written in this year's Town Report, the Commission, in conjunction with the Select Board, have continued to clarify the current conditions of both the sewer and water infrastructure of the Town.

Underwood Engineers has completed the report on the sewer infrastructure evaluation. Copies of their "Executive Summary" can be found on the town website (http://www.newcastlenh.org) or a hard copy can be reviewed at the Town Hall.

The Select Board has also hired Underwood Engineers to perform an infrastructure evaluation of the Town's water system, with emphasis on the firefighting capacity.

The discussion with Portsmouth regarding the takeover of the water and sewer system continues to be on-going. The results of the tests performed by Underwood Engineers will no doubt influence Portsmouth's decision.

As a reminder, the Water & Sewer Commission meets the second Wednesday of every month at 3:00 in the Town Hall. All residents are invited to attend the meetings. If you would like to speak on a specific topic, please notify Pam well in advance of the meeting, so that you can be placed on the agenda.

NEW CASTLE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Thank mother-nature spring is finally here! As the earth awakens and we begin to spruce up our yards in the coming months, please keep in mind that there are many choices we can make that will help reduce the amount of pollution that goes into our wetlands, tidal creeks, rivers and oceans.

New Castle is proud to be a leader on the seacoast in reducing the amount of fertilizer that runs off into our waters. Please remember, if you choose to use a fertilizer this spring, don't forget that only fertilizers that contain a minimum of 50% slow release nitrogen is allowed on the island. And don't forget to remind your landscaper that this is a town ordinance. The landscapers that the commission worked with to provide guidance on reducing runoff stated that there is no increase in the cost of fertilizing with a slow release formulation.

Another way you can help reduce pollution going into our waters is to plant native plants near the edge of a wetland or shoreline and upland. This will help reduce pollution and erosion, will help slow and absorb waters from flooding, and provide fish and wildlife food and cover habitat. And please remember that removing brush under 3 feet in height within a wetland buffer is not allowed without a permit from the town and state.

Thank you for taking part in protecting our islands natural resources!

FORT STARK HISTORIC SITE WILD ROSE LANE NEW CASTLE, NH


After last year's very successful one day World War II Living History Event at Fort Stark, it has been decided to expand the event to an entire weekend. In conjunction with the Living History Association, the reenactors hope to portray various military groups from the Revolutionary War until the present.

Some of the things which may be presented are: Camp setups, military vehicles, field offices, the home front and displays of military memorabilia which will allow the public to interact and learn about life for men and women during the wars. Reenactors will be dressed in period military and civilian attire to help represent the branches of the military as well as those who supported the war effort at home.

The Civil War ladies will demonstrate a camp laundry and ladies' fashions. Other eras will have similar demonstrations which they will present. Some military groups may be able to give a presentation on how to properly load and fire their muskets and military drills may be given at various times during the day.
